Behaviour Management System

What happens if I do make the right choices?

- . I will earn Class Dojo points.
- . I will be able join in with all of my Golden Time.
- . I might get a blue character ticket.
- . I can contribute to a whole class reward. (Extra break)

What happens if I don't make the right choices?

- 1. 1st time. An adult will remind me of my choices and further consequences. This is my verbal warning.
- 2. 2nd time. My name is written down and I lose 5 minutes of my playtime and this will be recorded by my teacher. I can check the school Behaviour Charter to remind myself of our agreement.
- 3. 3rd time. If I continue to ignore the rules, I lose another 5 minutes of my playtime. (name written down with '10minutes')
- 4. 4th time. I will have to work in a different classroom. I will have to fill in a Reflection Sheet to discuss with my teacher. This will also be sent home. I will also lose 10 minutes of golden time.

What happens if I don't make the right choices during playtime or lunchtime?

- 1. 1st time. An adult will remind me of my choices and further consequences. This is my verbal warning.
- 2. 2nd time. My name is written down and I lose 5 minutes of my playtime sitting on the bench. This will be passed on and recorded by my teacher.
- 3. 3rd time. If I continue to ignore the rules, I lose another 5 minutes of my playtime on the bench.
 - (Name written down with '10minutes' which will be passed on to my teacher)
- 4. 4th time. I will have to go inside to sit with Ms Jarrett or Mrs Tringham and I will have to fill in a Reflection Sheet to discuss with my teacher. This will also be sent home. I will also lose 10 minutes of golden time.

NB – Any playtime lost cannot be earned back, children will sit silently in a class with a timer.

If I complete 6 Reflection Sheets in a half term or make a serious breach of the rules, the school will talk to my parent/carer about a Thrive Assessment and a partnership approach will be put in place. This might include:

- .Home school communication system
- .Parental involvement as appropriate

We will also talk about alternative possibilities: for example, internal exclusion or exclusion from an after school club. In specific circumstances it may be exclusion from a visit or exclusion from a special visitor (as listed in the Serious Breach of the school rules and behaviour policy). It may be appropriate to use a specific behaviour intervention.

If I continue to need Reflection Time, Ms Jarrett will talk to my parent/carer to see what else I might need to support me in making the right choices.

I know that if I swear or physically hurt someone, I will go straight to number 4 and miss ten minutes of my playtime. A reflection sheet will be sent home to my parents.

Serious breach of the school rules and Behaviour Policy

For a serious breach of the school rules and Behaviour Policy the Head of School can issue a consequence:

- Exclusion from an after school club
- Internal half-day exclusion (working away from peers)
 Or in specific circumstances...
- Exclusion from a visit
- Exclusion from a special visitor

These consequences can be put in place for a child who:

- puts other children/adults at risk from their behaviour
- demonstrates complete non-compliance
- self-exits the school building and/or grounds,
- puts themselves at risk from their behaviour
- extreme physical aggression towards others
- bullying behaviour
